

## **Epistle Reading: Colossians 3: 12-16**

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. <sup>13</sup>Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. 14 And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

<sup>21</sup> And he said, "All these things I have kept from my youth."

<sup>22</sup> So when Jesus heard these things, He said to him, "You still lack one thing. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me."23 But when he heard this, he became very sorrowful, for he was very rich. <sup>24</sup> And when Jesus saw that he became very sorrowful, He said, "How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God! 25 For it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." <sup>26</sup> And those who heard it said, "Who then can be saved?"7 But He said, "The things which are impossible with men are possible with God."

## **Praying to the Saints**

"We should seek the intercessions and the fervent prayers of the saints, because they have special 'boldness' (parresia), before God.".....Saint John Chrysostom

#### THROUGH THEIR INTERCESSIONS ....

The Orthodox Church is a living and vibrant community of faithful Christians made up of the members of the Church militant and the church triumphant. The Church militant are those of us who are still part of this world, diligently striving to live our lives according to God's teachings and commandments. The Church triumphant are those individuals who have been called by God to be with Him in paradise and continue to pray for us.

Holiness or sainthood is a gift given by God to mankind through the Holy Spirit. Man's effort to become a participant in the life of divine holiness is indispensable, but sanctification itself is the work of the Holy Trinity, especially through the sanctifying power of Jesus Christ.

Bishop Kallistos Ware, a famous Orthodox Theologian, has stated that "in private, an Orthodox Christian is free to ask for the prayers of any member of the Church, whether canonized or not. It would be perfectly normal for an Orthodox child, if orphaned, to end his evening prayers by asking for the intercessions, not only of the Mother of God and the saints, but his own mother and father. In its public worship, however, the church usually prays only to those whom it has officially proclaimed as saints."

In the Orthodox Church there are six classifications of Saints:

- 1. The Apostles, who were the first ones to spread the message of the Incarnation of the Word of God and of salvation through Christ.
- 2. The Prophets, because they predicted and prophesied the coming of the Messiah.
- **3.** The Martyrs, for sacrificing their lives and fearlessly confessing Jesus Christ as the Son of God and the Savior of mankind.
- 4. The Fathers and Hierarchs of the Church, who excelled in explaining and defending, by word and deed, the Christian Faith.
- 5. The Monastics, who lived in the desert and dedicated themselves to spiritual exercise (askesis), reaching, as far as possible, perfection in Christ.
- 6. The Just, those who lived in the world, leading exemplary lives as clergy or laity with their families, becoming examples for imitation in society.

Each and every one among these saints has his or her own calling and characteristics: they all fought the "good fight for the faith" (I Tim. 6.12 and II Tim. 4.7). All of them applied in their lives the scriptural virtues of "justice, piety, fidelity, love, fortitude and gentleness" (I Tim. 6.11).

The ultimate goal of humankind is to imitate God and live the life of deification (theosis). Saint Maximos the Confessor describes saints as being men and women who have avoided the unnatural development of the soul, that is, sin, and tried to live the natural way of life, turning and looking always towards God, thus achieving total unity with God through the Holy Spirit. This is why we look to the example of their lives for strength and encouragement, and why we continue to pray to them to intercede on our behalf to our Lord.

## Ecumenical Patriarchate: We do not recognize any other form of union apart from marriage between man and woman

The Holy and Sacred Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate convened at the Phanar in Constantinople addressing the upcoming bill on same-sex marriage and adoption to be submitted by the Greek government.

The Synod reaffirmed the decision of the Holy and Great Council of Crete in June 2016, asserting that the Church does not recognize unions of same



or opposite-sex couples or any other form of union apart from marriage. According to the Council, the "union of man and woman in Christ" represents a sacred institution, constituting "a small church or an image of the Church".

The Synod clarified its stance, emphasizing that individuals entering into other forms of union "should be treated with pastoral responsibility and love in Christ". This reflects the commitment to compassionate pastoral care for all members of the Church, even as it upholds the traditional understanding of marriage.

The Holy and Sacred Synod, convened under the esteemed chairmanship of His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew during its session on Wednesday, January 24, 2024, wishes to address the devout faithful of the Ecumenical Throne regarding the ongoing discourse on the institutionalization of same-sex marriage and adoption in Greece.

We reiterate the binding Decision of the Holy and Great Council of the Orthodox Church, convened in Crete in June 2016. The Council unequivocally stated that "the Church does not accept for its members unions of same or opposite-sex couples and any other form of union apart from marriage." It emphasized the sacred significance of the union of man and woman in Christ, describing it as a small church or an image of the Church (cf. "The mystery of marriage and its impediments," I.10 and 4).

Simultaneously, we underscore that individuals within the Church who engage in alternative forms of union should be treated with pastoral responsibility and love in Christ.



The Together for Ukraine Foundation, Inc. (TFU) invites organizations, businesses, elected officials, faith communities and people of all backgrounds to "Believe in Ukraine" at the Broome County Courthouse on February 24, 2024 from 12-1 PM. The brief interfaith service will be followed by a light reception at Atomic Tom's at 196 State Street, Binghamton. Donations will be collected to provide humanitarian aid to Ukrainian civilians on the front lines and local refugees impacted by the war.

More than half a million Ukrainians have died in the war according to the New York Times, and over 180,000 have been injured. According to the United Nations, more than 6 million Ukrainians have been forced to leave their homes as refugees and 8 million have been internally displaced. Broome County has welcomed over 20 hard-working refugee families since the start of the war, and many Broome County residents are praying for loved ones injured, serving, or killed in the war in Ukraine.

## Assembly of Bishops Delegation in the 2024 March for Life

Washington, D.C. - The Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America sent a delegation to the annual March for Life in the nation's capital on Friday, January 19, 2024.

Bishop John (Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America) led the delegation. He was joined by Bishop Theophan (Albanian Orthodox Diocese of the Americas, Ecumenical Patriarchate), Metropolitan Tikhon (Orthodox Church in America) and Bishop Andrei (Romanian Orthodox Episcopate of America, Orthodox Church in America).



The members of the delegation attended the National Prayer Vigil for Life at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on Thursday, January 18, the evening before the march.

The next day, on Friday, January 19, Bishop John offered the opening prayer at the beginning of the rally on the National Mall where he said: "O Heavenly Father, Good Comforter, and Lord Jesus Christ; Creator of all things, you who knew us in our mother's womb and ordered the world for our salvation, protect your babies both born and unborn, guide their parents, reveal to us the ways which we should walk today and every-day..."

The Orthodox hierarchs were joined on-stage by Roman Catholic Bishops led by His Excellency Bishop Michael F. Burbidge, Bishop of Arlington and Chairman of the Committee on Pro-Life Activities of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Despite inclement weather, the march began at 1 p.m. and proceeded along Constitution Avenue to the U.S. Supreme Court, where prayers for the victims of abortion were offered.

#### Patriarch Theophilos III of Jerusalem Issues Plea for Peace in Holy Land

In a powerful demonstration of unity and Christian values, Patriarch Theophilos III of Jerusalem, delivered a compelling speech on behalf of all the Patriarchs and Heads of churches in the Holy Land, during the annual holiday meeting with President Isaac Herzog of Israel, demanding an immediate cessation of military activity in Gaza.

Addressing the critical issues facing the Holy Land, the Patriarch of Jerusalem emphasized the common moral values inherent in the great monotheistic faiths. He underscored the sanctity of every human life, the imperative for dignity, and the pursuit of freedom, safety, and security for all residents of the diverse Holy Land.

At the heart of the Patriarch's address was a poignant call to action – an urgent plea for an immediate permanent humanitarian ceasefire in Gaza. The leaders of the Holy Land Churches united in their commitment to peace, recognize the deepening humanitarian crisis and the suffering of innocent civilians caught in the midst of conflict. Their appeal resonates as a compassionate response to the ongoing violence that plagues the region.

Rejecting the notion of a military solution, the Heads of Churches advocated for dialogue and reconciliation as the only sustainable paths to peace. The call for a permanent ceasefire is not only an expression of moral values but a collective rejection of cycles of violence that have proven ineffective in bringing lasting peace.

Amidst the challenges posed by the ongoing conflict, the leaders of the churches of the Holy Land stress the importance of acting swiftly, urging that no more innocent lives be lost. His Beatitude's speech embraces the season of light and hope, expressing a collective aspiration for a better future where shared moral and spiritual values foster prosperity for all.
